SUBJECT: Cabinet Memorandum to Expand on the Executive Order 14152 Holding Former Government Officials Accountable for Election Interference and Improper Disclosure of Sensitive Governmental Information, Dated January 20, 2025

On behalf of the President and in furtherance of Executive Order, "Holding Former Government Officials Accountable for Election Interference and Improper Disclosure of Sensitive Governmental Information," Executive Order 14152, dated January 20, 2025, the Secretary of State, Secretary of Defense, the Director of National Intelligence, the Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, and the Director of the Office of Personnel Management are hereby directed to revoke unescorted access to secure U.S. Government facilities from the 50 former intelligence officials named in the Executive Order. These individuals no longer possess a need to access secure facilities, and as outlined in the Executive Order, do not have the appropriate security clearances to access classified information.

In the event any of the 50 former intelligence officials named in the Executive Order received a security clearance by virtue of employment with a private entity, the U.S. Government entity that granted the security clearance should inform the private entity that the individual's ability to access secure U.S. Government facilities and classified information has been revoked.

Additionally, if any of the 50 former intelligence officials named in the Executive Order obtained a security clearance from a U.S. Government entity not included as an addressee to this memorandum, the Director of the Office of Personnel Management shall provide this memorandum to the appropriate clearance-granting U.S. Government entity to ensure compliance.

This memorandum is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its

departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

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
